Program

The Department of Germanic Studies at Indiana University Bloomington is among the most renowned and innovative departments in the US. The faculty covers the entire spectrum of Germanic Studies, and faculty members are leaders in current research trends, from empathy studies, history of thought, and performance studies to Jewish studies, memory and diaspora studies, research in antisemitism, and theoretical linguistics. Institutions like the Center for Theoretical Inquiry in the Humanities, the Experimental Humanities Lab, and the Center for Eighteenth Century Studies present students the opportunity to collaborate with leading research initiatives and to find stimulation and support across disciplines. We offer language courses in Dutch, Norwegian, Yiddish, Old Norse, and Old and Middle High German. Concentrations and course of study

Our program offers degrees in two major fields: you can earn the PhD either in German literature and culture studies, or in Germanic linguistics and philology. In addition to your major, you earn a minor in a related field (e.g. Comparative Literature or Jewish Studies). Students take courses for two to three years, and after that develop the dissertation under intensive personal mentoring. Another important component of the program is the opportunity for shorter or longer research stays in Germany (Berlin). We encourage and mentor our students to participate in and organize conferences and to publish their research. Teaching, including the acquisition of pedagogical skills, is an integral part of the program, and you will be guided in your teaching by internationally recognized specialists.

Funding

The program offers five years of full financial support to fund your doctoral studies. The financial package ranges from \$22,000 to \$24,000 per year (depending on the year of study), consisting of fellowships and instructorships. The funding package includes health insurance and a complete waiver of tuition and fees.
